Call to Order and Opening Comments

Community Council President, Bill Crawford, unable to attend tonight. *Reminder that there is no July meeting.*

Police and Safety Report

- District 4 CPD Representative Johnson stepping in for Officer Bower who will be on maternity leave for the foreseeable future. Offer Johnson is Walnut Hills and Mt. Auburn liaison officer. The major issue right now in Corryville is personal crime – and theft from and of autos. A reminder to not leave your keys in your car! (See attached Corryville neighborhood report June 2002 for details.) CPD will be passing out flyers as reminders about how to provide car theft (see attached example). A neighborhood concern passed on to CPD was about the appearance of a shortage of police in the neighborhood. CPD is short-staffed in the uptown area. Another concern passed on was about people parking on MLK to run into Stetson Square to pick up food. A final concern was about an encampment of unhoused individuals in the downtown area – this area was cleared out but is now being repopulated.
- UC Officer Vestring also spoke about the car thefts in the UC area – they will be doing a similar awareness campaign about not leaving keys in the car. He is trying to get the new UC police chief, Chief Isaacs, to come to the August CCC meeting. Mentioned that the UCPD won the Herman Goldstein award for crime prevention. UCPD also thanked the Corryville Community for their contributions to the Shop with a Cop event in December



2021. See attached UC Police Report for information about important dates of upcoming UC events.

New Business

- Discussion of the new potential project taking place in the air rights above the Kroger parking lot on the south side of the building. Prior to Covid-19, Tru Hotel brought a hotel project before the CCC and CCC Board for our approval. That project has fallen apart and now Uptown Properties is hoping to put up a rental building in the space. It will largely be built in the same area as the proposed Tru Hotel. Uptown came to the CCC board to present the project, but they don't have renderings or even fixed plans regarding height, units, etc. Board approved the project – as proposed – but we are all waiting to see more details about what will be happening in this part of Corryville.

Old Business

- Brief discussion of the ongoing conversation at city level about locating a new dog park in the uptown area and lack of engagement with community. This is an ongoing topic that some residents are interested in and pursuing with the Park Board and city.
- Brief discussion of the fishing line recycling installations in Burnet Woods near the pond. We hear that these are not up yet. CCC funded the purchase of materials and we have been told that they are assembled, so we are waiting to see them installed now.

Treasurer's Report

- We haven't spent any money recently, other than the cost of pizza tonight!

SVA Report

- Dan Luther reported on behalf of the SVA that the CCC will be helping to subsidize the cost of arts programming that is happening on Short Vine throughout the summer, organized by the CCAC. A couple of ongoing events – the yarn bombing art that has been installed into the arches on Short Vine and the Music on Fridays at lunch time in the plaza on Short Vine.

NSP and AIG Report

- NSP Coordinator Fran Larkin was unable to attend the meeting. As a reminder, we are able to access funding for community needs and desires. Please be thinking of ways to use this funding for the improvement of all facets of Corryville.

CRC Report

- CRC director Rachel Re reported on the ways that funding associated with the Uptown property development across the street from the Rec. Center was being used to improve



the rec center. These include \$95k for new equipment and a floor in the weight room; a new scoreboard and divider curtain for the gym (both on order); new tables, chairs, carts, Washer and Dryer, cabinets; deep cleaning of the entire facility and a steam cleaning machine; and new TV screens.

- The CRC will have an open house in June or July to show off the improvements
- There will be a 3 on 3 basketball tournament at the CRC on July 30th from 12 – 6 pm. More information forthcoming.

Community Requests

- Tabatha Adkins asked if there had been any more engagement with the Zoo about the work they're doing at their parking lot on Vine street. We have not heard from them in awhile and will reach out to see if they can come to a future meeting to report on their ongoing activities.
- Tim Hof mentioned the city code violations regarding the number of unrelated residents living in Corryville buildings as a driving issue behind the ongoing parking problem in Corryville.
- Naomi Miller mentioned that the Welcome to Corryville sign at University and Burnet looks particularly good. Great to hear!

Announcements

- Corryville resident Naomi Miller made an announcement about the [Black Family Reunion](#) happening August 18 – 21. She has arranged for a table to be held for Corryville Residents at the August 19th Heritage Breakfast at Fountain Square. - Ed Rieth of the People's Church announced that they have a tentative agreement to use the former Hebrew Union College campus on Clifton Ave. while their own campus is being renovated with a new building complex. They have renderings of the new campus that Ed shared at the meeting. He also noted that they are planning to include a walking trail on the new campus to accommodate the current / existing walking paths that are used to cross the property.







Rolling 28 Day Reported Offenses
